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EMERGENCY SERVICES AND VOLUNTEERS FUND

The Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) is a new Victorian Government levy (replacing the Fire Services Property Levy) due to be introduced on 1 July, 2025.

The farming sector was to be the hardest hit by the new tax with a proposed increase of 150%.

In response to significant backlash, on 30 May the Victorian Government announced a temporary backdown on the ESVF for the farming sector only and declared the entire state of Victoria in drought.

How will it impact us?

The drought declaration means the ESVF variable rate on primary production properties will remain at 28.7 – the same as it was in 2024-25 – for the duration of the 2025-26 financial year.

This reduced rate will be applied to rates notices for primary production properties automatically.

Whilst we welcome the reprieve for farmers, the concern for the hike in the levy for residential and commercial property owners remains.

The new tax will also have a significant impact on Council. The cost alone to administer this extra tax collection is significant, and this ultimately impacts the services we deliver to the community.

"Just don't pay" - it's not that simple

The local government sector has been advocating for the levy to be collected by the State Revenue Office, not Council.

These efforts have been unsuccessful and unfortunately, you will see the levy itemised on your rates bill, even though it is not a Council charge.

We have heard the suggestions to "just don't pay the new tax". Unfortunately, it's not that simple.

Councils are obligated to collect the levy and cannot use a separate invoice to collect the levy.

Also, Council must proportionally allocate rates revenue towards the levy if ratepayers choose not to pay the levy element on their rates notice. For example, if your rates are \$3,000, and the levy is \$500 and if the property owner pays only the \$3,000 rate component, Council collects \$2,550 (roughly 85% of payment in this example) and the \$450 balance goes off to the Government for the ESVF. We know that will be significantly more for many ratepayers. Plus your rates notice will still be in arrears.

Unfortunately, ratepayers who refuse to pay the levy may cause financial strain on councils across the state. It may also be subject to Council's debt collecting processes – something we agree is unfair.

You will hear more from us about the levy prior to receiving your 2025/26 rates notice.

What next?

Alongside the local government sector, we will continue to advocate for the ESVF to be scrapped. Emergency services should be properly funded through the State's general revenue – just like other essential public services.

If you are a farmer, commercial business owner, or have vacant land, talk to your accountant or financial advisor about how you may be able to minimise the impact of the levy.

If you are a CFA or SES volunteer, investigate with the emergency services organisation you represent how you can get the volunteer rebate on your principal place of residence or farm. This rebate is not administered by Council.

If you are experiencing any difficulty in paying your rates, please talk to us as soon as possible. We're here to help.

In our last edition we invited our community to share "what matters to you?"

We received feedback from community members, groups and organisations across our Shire throughout March, April and May.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to contribute via surveys, community conversation events and focus groups.

We also heard from 240 young people via class activities and drawing activities – some of which are featured on the opposite page. This is in addition to our consultation with our local secondary schools – Maryborough Education Centre and Highview College. Around 40 students contributed to in-person workshops across both schools in addition to 212 written submissions.





Our community panel

In May, 14 members of our community came together over three workshops as part of our Community Panel. Under the Local Government Act we are required to bring together a diverse group of community members to help shape the draft Plan.

We sincerely thank the members of the Community Panel for their time, thoughtfulness, passion and commitment. Their willingness to listen, learn, and work together to shape meaningful recommendations has made a valuable contribution to this process and to the future of our community.

Next steps

Taking all your feedback on board, along with the insights from our Community Panel, our Draft Council Plan will soon be available for our community to review.

We'll be inviting you to share with us – Did we get it right? Anything we missed?

Community feedback on the Draft Council Plan will be invited in August.

The final Council Plan will go to Council for adoption in September.

What matters most?

Community members shared what they found to be most valuable that was delivered by the last Council Plan, the top five being:

- 1. Renewal of pool facilities at Dunolly, Talbot and 25m indoor pool (59%)
- 2. Street tree planting program (52%)
- 3. Advocacy for additional rail services (50%)
- 4. Go-Goldfields The Nest (45%)
- 5. Volunteer capacity building (44%)

What do you think we do best as a community?

Many people said we're at our best when we support each other — especially in times of crisis or hardship. There's also strong appreciation for the volunteers, shared spaces, and the sense of connection that exists across Central Goldfields.

What could we do better? What would you like to see?

Many people want to see more action and follow-through from Council, and more focus on the basics. There's also a call to listen to all voices, not just the loudest, and to invest fairly across the whole Shire – not just in a few projects or places.

Community members wanted Council to:

- Fix roads and footpaths and manage trees
- Maintain and improve infrastructure and assets: 50m pool, Carisbrook Creek, Goldfields Reservoir
- Strengthen tourism and economic development focus
- Attract more industry and jobs
- Provide opportunity for businesses to network and innovate
- Focus less on niche projects and more on the whole community's needs
- Provide more activities and support for families, older adults, and young people
- Improve healthcare and childcare access and transport between towns
- Reduce delays and communicate clearly on plans and progress
- Make the most of local skills, especially from retirees and volunteers
- Keep successful programs like The Nest going with funding and support
- Listen to more of the community
- Transportation/evacuation in emergency situations
- Strengthen financial and project management

OUTDOOR POOL WHAT'S NEXT?

\$4.5 million has been secured for the Outdoor Pool by the Federal Labor Government (announced as an election commitment in April).

We now await the outcome of our \$3 million funding application to the Victorian Government's Regional Community Sports and Infrastructure Fund. If successful, Council will co-contribute a further \$1.5 million (\$150,000 in the 2025-26 Annual Budget and \$1.35 million in future borrowings in the 2026-27 Annual Budget) to the project.

An outcome of the Victorian Government grant application is expected in July.



The Green Bin.



In the Autumn edition, we shared the news that the way you use your bins at home will change by July 2027.

This is because the Victorian Government is standardising kerbside services across all councils in Victoria.

This will see us move to a four-stream waste collection service which will help reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill and improve the quality of recyclables.

As part of the changes, every urban household will be required to place their food and garden organics into a lime green lid bin by 2027.

What is a food and garden organics bin?

In Victoria, about 50% of household waste is organic. Using a dedicated food and garden organics bin keeps food and garden waste out of landfill, cuts emissions, and turns it into compost for local use.

Here in our Shire, we've had a twice monthly, optional food and garden organics collection service in place since 2013.

What can I put in the food and garden organics bin?

Almost any food and garden material can go into the food and garden organics bin. Basically – if it grows – it can go in!

- ✓ Fruit and vegetable scraps
- Cooked and uncooked food
- ✓ Meat, poultry and small bones
- Bread, rice pasta and cereal
- Eggs and egg shells
- Fish and other seafood
- ✓ Food wrapped in newspaper
- Tea leaves and coffee grounds
- Dairy products including cheese, yoghurt and cream
- Shredded paper, soiled paper and raw cardboard (pizza boxes, fish and chip wrapping)
- Bark, prunings and small branches (no bigger than 100mm diameter and no longer than your bin)
- ✔ Weeds, lawn clippings, leaves and small plants
- Paper towel and tissues

FOGO

You'll start to hear the acronym FOGO more regularly from here. FOGO is short for Food and Garden Organics.

What do we do with your organics?

It takes around 16 weeks to convert your organics from the time it is collected at your house to becoming bagged compost:




Resident places organics into their green (FOGO) bin ready for collection



Delivered to our composting facility at the Carisbrook Transfer Station



Moved to curing bays where it is cooked for a further two months to produce mature compost



Mulched into smaller pieces and placed into compost bays (for between 6 and 12 weeks)



Manually sorted for contamination



Mature compost is screened



Compost bagged



When supply allows, residents who have opted into the service are eligible to receive a bag of compost for their garden

State-wide waste collection changes – what next?

We are committed to rolling-out the new four-waste stream service in a way that best meets the needs of our community.

To do this we will be guided by the Victorian Government's Service Standards along with community input and service costs.

Since February, our Waste team have been talking to residents about waste at local markets, schools, shopping centres, and every household received the Waste Management Survey 2025 by mail.

Thank you to everyone who took the time to share their feedback to us either in person, online or by mail.

A decision on what our four-stream waste service will look like in 2027 will be made by late 2025/early 2026 and our community will be kept informed at every step of the transition.

Local investment

Upgrades are now complete at the Tullaroop Leisure Centre (pictured above) and a new perimeter fence has been installed at the Majorca Cemetery thanks to funding from the Victorian Government's Tiny Towns Fund and Council.

Rail trail milestone

Castlemaine Maryborough Rail Trail Inc., with support from the Mount Alexander Shire, Central Goldfields Shire and the State and Federal Government is leading a project to develop a 55km rail trail between Maryborough and Castlemaine.

Following the development of a feasibility study in 2023, a landscape architect was recently appointed to progress the pre-construction phase of the project. Stage two is being funded by the State Government and is expected to be complete in May 2026.

Since my last feature, I was re-elected for a second term and so with much gratitude, I would like to thank everyone for allowing me to be your voice at Council for the next four years.

Speaking of voices – I, along with many others, have been advocating strongly against the new Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF).

Thankfully, in late May, it was announced that the ESVF levy will be capped at the 2024–25 rates for all Primary Producers and the Victorian Government's Drought Support Package will be made available to all Victorian farmers, not just those in drought declared shires. A most welcome reprieve. Dry conditions have also meant that kangaroos are prevalent on roadsides as they are searching for green pick growing on run-off moisture. Not a day goes by that I don't see vehicles with significant damage.

So please be careful out there and slow down during dusk and dawn. If you do strike an animal, please call Central Goldfields Wildlife Rescue on 0499 654 950 to assist.

Facility upgrades

Community assets in Talbot, Adelaide Lead and Bowenvale have been upgraded thanks to funding from the Victorian Government's Tiny Towns Funding and Council.

Funding for community assets

Thanks to Council investment, and funding through the Victorian Government's Tiny Towns program, electrical upgrades have been delivered at the Dunolly Senior Citizens Hall and Bealiba's historic horse trough has been relocated (pictured right).



Deledio pavilion update

The Deledio Reserve pavilion project is progressing with JMA Architects recently appointed and the design tender to be advertised shortly.

In partnership with the Deledio Pavilion Reference Group, we've been successful in securing \$1 million from the Victorian Government and a further \$1.5 million in Federal Government funding for the project. Council will also contribute \$500,000 to the project.

The project includes new change rooms, kitchen and kiosk facilities, undercover areas, first aid facilities, and will include sustainable rainwater harvesting and solar power.
